## WATER CONSERVATION

*In 1990, 30 states in the US reported 'water-stress' conditions. In 2000, the number of states reporting water-stress rose to 40. In 2009, the number rose to 45. There is a worsening trend in water supply nationwide. Taking measures at home to conserve water not only saves you money, it is also of benefit to the greater community.*

*Saving water at home does not require any significant cost outlay. Although there are water-saving appliances and water conservation systems such as rain barrels, drip irrigation and on-demand water heaters which are more expensive, the bulk of water saving methods can be achieved at little cost. For example, 75% of water used indoors is in the bathroom, and 25% of this is for the toilet. The average toilet uses 4 gallons per flush (gpf). You can invest in a ULF (ultra-low flush) toilet which will use only 2 gpf. But you can also install a simple tank bank, costing about \$2, which will save .8 gpf. This saves 40% of what you would save with the ULF toilet. Using simple methods like tank banks, low-flow showerheads and faucet aerators you can retrofit your home for under \$50.*

*By using water-saving features you can reduce your in-home water use by 35%. This means the average household, which uses 130,000 gallons per year, could save 44,00 gallons of water per year. On a daily basis, the average household, using 350 gallons per day, could save 125 gallons of water per day. The average individual, currently using 70 gallons per day, could save 25 gallons of water per day.*

*When buying low-flow aerators, be sure to read the label for the actual 'gpm' (gallons per minute) rating. Often, the big box retailers promote "low-flow" which are rated at 2.5 gpm, which is at the top of the low-flow spectrum. This may be needed for the kitchen sink, but we find that a 15 gpm aerator works fine for the bathroom sink and most water outlets, delivering the same spray force in a comfortable, soft stream.*

*Finally, it should be noted that installing low-flow aerators, showerheads, tank banks and other water-saving devices usually is a very simple operation which can be done by the homeowner and does not even require the use of tools. Water conservation at home is one of the easiest measures to put in place, and saving water should become part of everyday family practice.*

# RECYCLING GUIDELINES

## ACCEPTABLE ITEMS:

- Aluminum food and beverage containers
- Glass food and beverage containers-brown, clear, or green
- Bi-Metal, Steel and Aerosol cans
- PET Plastic containers with the symbol #1 narrow neck containers only



- HDPE Plastic containers with the symbol #2 narrow neck containers

such as milk and water bottles, detergent, shampoo, bleach bottles etc. without caps

- Plastics with symbols #3,#4,#5,#6 #7 narrow and screw top containers
- Newsprint
- Cardboard-flattened in 2' x 2' bundles (may be placed in recycling bin along with other recycling)

- Residential mixed paper (Junk Mail, magazines, glossies, telephone books, printer/copier paper)
- Cereal Boxes

## NON-ACCEPTABLE ITEMS:

- Window or Auto glass, drinking glasses, mirrors, light bulbs, ceramic, porcelain, microwave trays, glass cookware/bake ware
- Unnumbered plastic items
- Plastic Bags
- Salad/Deli containers, Plastic food tubs
- Household items such as cooking pots

Since 1945 the Dover Township Volunteer Fire Department has been providing fire and rescue services to Dover Township and surrounding municipalities. In 2014, we operated on 654 emergency calls for service with our all volunteer force. The officers and members of the DTVFD are committed to providing the highest level of service possible to our community and spend hundreds of hours each year training on various fire, EMS, and rescue disciplines. With more responsibilities and a growing community, we are in need of more volunteers to keep our organization moving forward. No experience is required and we will provide you with everything that is needed to get you trained as a certified firefighter.

Don't want to be a firefighter?

That's fine! We are also in need of administrative members to help with fundraising, committees, special projects, etc. Administrative members are very important to our department's operations. ## FREE Household Hazardous Waste Collection

### Authority Announces Location Change for Household Hazardous Waste Collection

The York County Solid Waste Authority will hold a FREE Household Hazardous Waste Collection Program on Saturday, ***May 2 from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM in the parking lot of Woodland View York, LP located at 915 Woodland View Drive in Manchester Township.***

Residents who bring in elemental mercury and/or a mercury-containing device such as a thermostat, thermometer or elemental mercury will receive a \$5 gift card for Lowe's. Covanta York Renewable Energy, the operator of the Authority's waste-to-energy facility, is partnering with the Authority to sponsor the gift card exchange to encourage residents to eliminate mercury from the waste stream. There is a two-gift card limit per household. Compact fluorescent light bulbs are not eligible for the gift card exchange, but will be accepted at the HHW program. There are a limited number of gift cards available for distribution on May 2.

Household hazardous waste includes any products from the home that are **corrosive** (drain cleaners or bleach), **flammable** (gasoline), **reactive** (chemistry kits) or **toxic** (pesticides). The program benefits York County by identifying hazardous wastes found in the home and providing an opportunity to manage these materials in a safe and efficient manner.

All York County homeowners or residential tenants are eligible to bring their household hazardous waste to the collection site. Due to state regulatory requirements, commercial entities are not eligible to participate. There is no fee to participate. The program is made possible by funding generated from tipping fees collected at the York County Resource Recovery Center and a grant from the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection. After collection, a licensed hazardous waste commercial hauler hired by the Authority will transport the material offsite where it will then be recycled, incinerated, land-filled or neutralized at licensed hazardous waste facilities.

Examples of items accepted include: thermometers containing mercury, liquid mercury, auto products (transmission and brake fluids, antifreeze, batteries), pesticides, herbicides, insecticides, fluorescent light bulbs, gasoline, kerosene, rechargeable batteries-- Nickel Cadmium (Ni-Cd), Nickel Metal Hydride (Ni-MH), Lithium Ion (Li-ion), and Small Sealed Lead (Pb), photographic and pool chemicals, driveway sealant, and household cleansers (oven, drain, etc.).

Please do not bring paint or other paint-related products including: latex and oil-based paint, turpentine, paint thinners, varnish, and paint strippers or removers. **Also, DO NOT bring alkaline batteries (i.e.: AAA's, AA's, C's, D's, etc.) aerosol cans, explosives, ammunition, propane tanks, used motor oil or medications.** Dispose of alkaline batteries in your regular garbage. For a listing of York County Collection Centers accepting used motor oil for recycling, call the Authority at 717-845-1066. For questions about how to safely dispose of other items, request the Authority's "What Kind of Waste is Accepted at the Resource Recovery Center Brochure". **Can't make the May 2 event? An option called "At Your Door Special Collection<sup>s</sup>" enables York County residents to call a toll-free number to schedule a home pick-up of household hazardous waste. The number is: 800-449-7587. Residents may schedule two pick-ups per home, per calendar year and can request up to two "kit bags" per pick-up to fill with accepted household hazardous products. "At Your Door Special Collection<sup>s</sup>" pick-ups require a \$15 co-pay.**

## WHAT YOU CAN DO TO PROTECT OUR WATER QUALITY

Have you ever stopped to think what happens when water goes down the STORM DRAINS in Dover Township?

The condition of the water going “down the drain” directly affects our quality of life as well as the quality of life of communities located downstream of us. Storm drains carry more than rainwater runoff. Stormwater (if we are not careful) will provide a means for trash and pollutants to get into local streams and waterways. REMEMBER that “Once pollutants find their way into streams and waterways drinking water supplies and wildlife habitats are affected”.

Simple little things you can do to protect local and regional water supplies are :

- Use fertilizers, pesticides, herbicides & fungicides sparingly on lawns and gardens.

- Never discharge pool or spa water to a street or storm drain. Let chlorine dissipate for a few days, then drain it gradually onto a landscaped or grassy area. Do not use copper based algacides unless absolutely necessary. Control algae with chlorine or other alternatives.

- Remove all pet waste from yards, curbs, and sidewalks and dispose of in the trash to prevent the spread of bacteria.

- Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on the lawn, not in the street.

- Stop any trash, leaves, grass clippings and soil from entering storm drains.

- Clean up all oil and fuel spills or leaks with absorbent materials such as kitty litter and rags. Then dispose of all spent material properly.

- Practice environmentally sound business and home care decisions, don't buy and use more chemicals than you actually need to do the job.

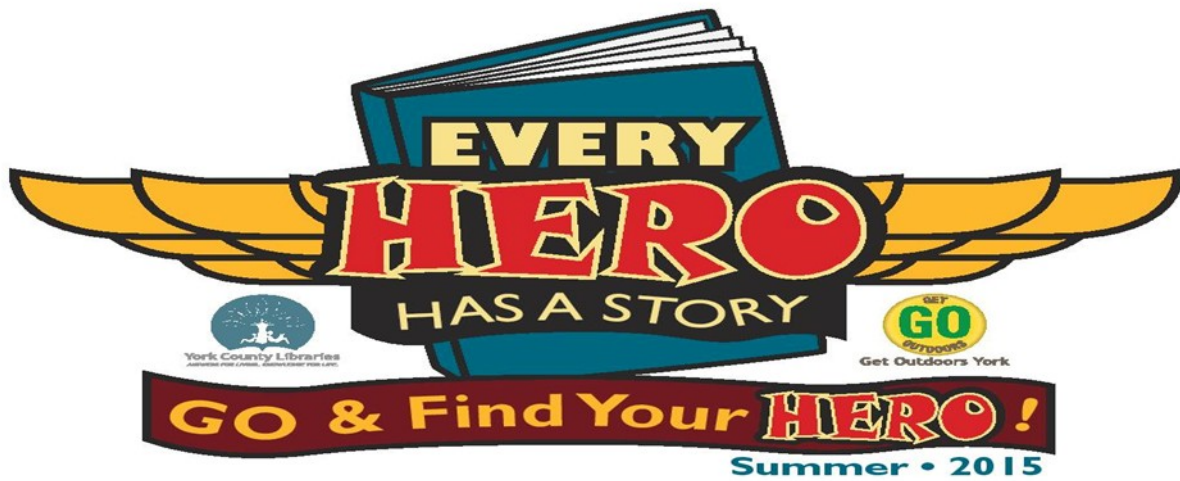
### Dover Area Ambulance

### WATER SYSTEM INFORMATION:

This report shows our water quality and what it means. If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Chuck Farley at 717-292-3634. We want you to be informed about your water supply. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled Board of Supervisors meetings. They are normally scheduled the 2nd and 4th Monday of the month, unless the date happens to be a holiday. ### SOURCE(S) OF WATER:

Our water sources are 10 wells located inside the physical boundaries of Dover Township. Currently the water from our wells is disinfected as the only form of treatment. However in 2014 the township constructed a permitted Nitrate Removal system at well 10. Well 10 is expected to be placed in service with its Nitrate Removal system by the Spring 2015. We also purchase fully treated and disinfected water from the York Water Company.

A Source Water Protection Plan (SWP Plan) was completed in 2010 by SSM Group, Inc. The Plan was paid for by the PA Department of Environmental Protection (Pa. DEP). The SWP Plan found that our source(s) are potentially susceptible to RCRA facilities, golf courses, transportations corridors, commercial property, gas stations, underground fuel tanks, quarries, farming and manure application practices, and natural gas pipe lines. However due to water quality monitoring and the regulation of land use activities within our well head protection areas, the risk of contamination is low.

Our SWP Plan is available for public review at the Dover Township Municipal Building, 2480 West Canal Road, Dover, PA 17315. Call Chuck Farley, PWD at 717-292-3634 if you wish to schedule a review of our SWP Plan.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

## MONITORING YOUR WATER:

We routinely monitor for contaminants in your drinking water according to federal and state laws. The following tables show the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2014. The State allows us to monitor for some contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently. Some of our data is from prior years in accordance with the Safe Drinking Water Act. The date has been noted on the sampling results table.

### DEFINITIONS:

Action Level (AL) - The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) - The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) - The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL) - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG) - The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

Minimum Residual Disinfectant Level (MinRDL) - The minimum level of residual disinfectant required at the entry point to the distribution system.

Treatment Technique (TT) - A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

pCi/L = picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)

ppb = parts per billion, or micrograms per liter ( $\mu\text{g/L}$ )

ppm = parts per million, or milligrams per liter ( $\text{mg/L}$ )

## EDUCATIONAL INFORMATION:

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater run-off, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater run-off, and residential uses.

Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.

Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA and DEP prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA and DEP regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

### Information about Lead

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Dover Township is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drink-
