2016 Budget: Per Capita Tax Repealed, plus no Real Estate or Utility Rate Increases

Dover Township is proud to present the highlights of the 2016 Budget. The Board of Supervisors has not increased real estate taxes since 2008, when the millage rate was increased from .828 to 1 whole mil of tax. This means on a \$100,000 assessed home, we receive \$100.00 in real estate tax to use towards the General Fund Operations. Those operations include Parks and Recreation, Fire, Highway, Solid Waste Collection (Leaf and Brush Collection), Planning and Zoning, Police and Administration. The breakout of your \$100 in real estate taxes is shown in the chart below.

2016 will include various road and stormwater improvements. Grant funds are being pursued to perform a streambank stabilization project between Danielle and Willapa Drives. A left turn lane is scheduled to be installed on Davidsburg Road near Tower Drive and Jayne Lane. Community Development Block Grant Funds will be used to replace a culvert on Nursery Road. Sealcoating will be performed on George Street, Paradise Road, Pinchtown Road (W. Canal to Admire Rd.) and Temple School Road. A portion Rohlers Church Road will receive an overlay. Additional work held over from last year's projects include Palomino Road (Base repair) and Paradise Road (Base repair). In addition, bridge and guiderail work is planned. Equipment purchases for 2016 include a new backhoe and a crew cab truck.

The Budget also includes maintenance work to the Township Building and Parks. Paving the parking lot of the Municipal Building and engineering work to design a new garage are budgeted. Painting and repairs will be made to the Barn at the former Golf Course property. Edgewood Park will receive a new baseball field. An emergency generator and new LED lighting will be installed at the Community Building,

The Sewer Collection System is currently under a consent order with the Department of Environmental Protection to resolve infiltration and inflow into the system. We have budgeted significant funds to make repairs as breaks, cracks or leaks are discovered within the system. We have completed two lining projects in Cypress South Development/Davidsburg Road and East Canal Road over the last two years. This process is less costly then digging up and replacing existing lines. We have budgeted for another lining project in 2016, but have yet to determine the location for this project. The Sewer Authority is preparing for upsizing the Palomino Road Interceptor, a portion of the Joint User line (located along the Little Conewago Creek) and building a new line north of the Borough for future business growth.

The Water System continues to work toward improvements of a new well location at the McNaughton/Bupp property, replacing water line on Staunton and Highland Avenues and engineering for a water main replacement project on Route 74 North of the Borough. Well Analysis' will be performed in an effort to prepare for our Water Allocation Permit Renewal in 2018.

The roads on the left

have been designated as snow emergency routes. No person shall operate a motor vehicle on the designated roads in a manner that may cause the vehicle to become stalled either by not being properly equipped with chains or effective snow tires or running out of gas. The term motor vehicles also include, but are not limited to, snowmobiles, trailers, three-wheeled and four-wheeled vehicles. If a snow emergency is declared, parking on these streets is prohibited until the emergency is declared terminated.

Things to Keep In Mind...

*If a storm is anticipated, remove vehicles from the roadside shoulders. This allows plows to clear the area the first time through, making return trips unnecessary.

*Do not shovel snow into the road or have your driveway plowed into the road. This can cause a serious traffic hazard.

*If possible, wait until the road has been plowed before cleaning out the end of your driveway. There is no practical way to plow the road without depositing snow into your driveway.

*Plow operators are urged to take precautions to avoid hitting mailbox posts. Experience has shown that reduced visibility during a storm makes it difficult for a driver to see a post in time to avoid striking it or pushing it over with plowed snow. Any installation with the right-of-way, including a mailbox is placed there at the owner's risk.

*Do not be misled by trucks running with their plows raised. They may be returning for fuel or they may be headed to another area. The municipality may not be responsible for all roads in the area. Some roads may be maintained by the state, some by the county, and some roads may be private (as in developments where roads have not yet been dedicated).

DOVER TOWNSHIP WATER AND SEWER

Checking for Leaks

A sudden increase in your water charges could indicate a water leak. Water leaks are often silent and unnoticeable until you get a high water bill.

To check for a leak:

- Turn off all faucets in and around the house.
- Make sure the dishwasher and washing machine are not on.
- Switch off the ice-maker.
- Find your water meter box which is usually located in your front yard near the property line.
- Look for a leak indicator on your meter (usually a small triangle dial visible through the meter sight glass).
- If the indicator is spinning, water is running through the meter and you have a leak.

• If you do not have a leak indicator, write down all of the numbers on the register including the position of the dial if there is one.

• Leave all of the water off in the house and check the meter again in one hour. If the dial has moved or the numbers have changed, you have a leak.

- If you verified a leak, you need to find out where it is.
- The most common culprit is a toilet. A hanging flapper valve or a flap that is not seated correctly can cause water to constantly seep from the tank to the bowl. The flapper valves and internal components do wear out, requiring servicing.

• Take the toilet tank lid off and see if you can either hear or see a leak. If not, place a few drops of food coloring in the tank (the back of the toilet). Let it sit for 15-20 minutes without flushing. Then check the bowl for traces of the food coloring. If the water in the bowl is colored, you have found a leak.

• Other common leaks are faucets that drip or slowly run. Make sure and check outside spigots and around the bottom of your hot water heater also. Even small leaks can add up quickly.

• If you have determined that you do have a leak and can't find it, then it could be underground. Most plumbing service companies have detection equipment and are experienced in finding underground leaks. The Dobbin Plantersville Water Service Corporation typically does not repair water leaks on the customer or "service" side of the meter and would not be involved in the repair.

To Flush or Not To Flush Disposable vs. Flushable



Clean water is critical to sustaining life and health, yet people often take for granted the flow of water into and out of their homes and businesses. Where does it go after we flush the toilet, empty the sink, take a shower or do laundry?

Wastewater drains into a community's sanitary sewer system, an underground network of pipes that leads to the wastewater treatment plant. At the wastewater treatment plant, the used water is "cleaned" by several treatment processes and returned back to the environment to be used over and over again.

Sewers are designed to take away used water from sinks, baths, showers, laundries and toilets. Flushing away "unflushable" items such as garbage, paper towels and wipes create blockages in sewers. This leads to backups and adds to the cost of operating and maintaining your sewers and the treatment plant. "Disposable" does not mean flushable. "Disposable" is a product for single use that can be recycled or thrown away after it is used. Baby wipes and adult wipes are not flushable because they stay intact in water and don't disintegrate like toilet paper. Even wipes labeled "flushable" should NOT be flushed. These wipes stay intact and will cause sewers to clog. Sewer clogs can result in sewage backing up into homes. Yuck! These wipes should be thrown away in a trash can. Other items such as rags, towels, diapers, kitty litter, cigarette butts and unused medicines should be disposed of properly – in the trash and not in your sewer!

RECYCLING GUIDELINES

Acceptable Items:

- Aluminum food and beverage containers
- Glass food and beverage containers-brown, clear, or green
- Bi-Metal, Steel and Aerosol cans
- PET Plastic containers with the symbol #1 narrow neck containers only
- HDPE Plastic containers with the symbol #2 narrow neck containers such as milk and water bottles, detergent, shampoo, bleach bottles etc. **without** caps
- Plastics with symbols #3,#4,#5,#6 #7 narrow and screw top containers
- Newsprint
- Cardboard-flattened in 2' x 2' bundles (may be placed in recycling bin along with other recycling)
- Residential mixed paper (Junk Mail, magazines, glossies, telephone books, printer/copier paper)
- Cereal Boxes

Non-Acceptable Items:

- Window or Auto glass, drinking glasses, mirrors, light bulbs, ceramic, porcelain, microwave trays, glass cookware/ bake ware
- Unnumbered plastic items
- Plastic Bags
- Salad/Deli containers, Plastic food tubs
- Household items such as cooking pots
- Batteries
- Cardboard/Paper with wax coating or liners
- Scrap metal, siding

Did you know?

The Department was founded over 70 Years ago.

We had buildings on Alta Vista Road- Carlisle Road and now on Davidsburg Road.

We responded to over 600 alarms in 2015.

All our members are volunteers.

We have several members with over 40 years of volunteer service.

We have agreements with Dover Borough, West Manchester, East Berlin, Jackson Township, Conewago Township,

Manchester Township and York City to assist them if needed and they will assist us if needed.

Funding comes from taxes, Bingo on Friday nights and our annual Fund drive. We also apply for Grants yearly

We have 11 members who currently live at the fire station- this provides us with response times of under 1 minute from time we receive the alarm 24 hours a day ,7 days a week 365 days a year.

We have 2 fire engines and 1 rescue truck as well as 3 support vehicles.

Our members are part of the County Technical Rescue Team and respond to Water Rescue calls, Trench collapse, Building Collapse, Ice rescue and Confined space rescue.

Our Fire Police respond to help local police at traffic and fire incidents and can be called on to help at special events.

A new tanker truck is on order to supply 3000 gallons of water to residents who do not live near a fire hydrant. Almost 80% of the Township does not have hydrants.

The department has a Board of Directors who manage the day to day operations of the department.

We provide station tours to groups- simply call the station at 292-4196 to schedule.

It takes hundreds of hours to train a new firefighter and we never stop learning and training.

We have administrative positions just like a business such as Treasurer, Membership Director, Secretary, Vice President, President, Financial and House Directors.
